6. Business Arising from the Minutes

7. OPP Report

• Quarterly Report (April-June 2025)

Acting Inspector Bosa presented the Q2 report as attached in the July 23, 2025, meeting agenda package. The overview can be captured in totality by viewing the YouTube recording of the meeting at a time stamp of approximately 1:18 p.m. Highlights included:

- Staffing updates 4 new probationary Constables members come to the detachment area. Several recruits are in line to come to the detachment in the near future
- Overall collisions are up Year to date (YTD)
- There has been more traffic engagement, with a focus on public education
- Violent crime there is a noted uptake
- Offences in uttering threats
- This could be in part to efforts to support high data integrity and catching calls for service properly
- Property crime is down
- Trafficking is up 213% YTD 47 charges compared to 14. This is due in part to some large cases being closed recently (e.g. case charging 32 individuals)
- Patrol hours have dipped YTD. Due to Officers responding for calls for service
- Foot patrol hours are projected to be increased in the next quarter
- Mental Health Calls for service remains consistent with 2024. There are 2 MCERT officers who are taking a very proactive approach and working with MESA team to do more foot patrols
- Overdoses are lower than they have been in the past 3 years
- Victim referrals are up, can also be correlated with the uptake in violent crimes
- Does the OPP lobby for changes in the judicial system for addresses drug charges?
 Response included that this is being addressed at the Provincial/Federal level
- What do probationary Constables do during probation? Do they stay in the area?
 Response included that probationary constables are typically placed where they
 request if it can be accommodated (3 years). They are paired up with a seasoned
 partner who trains them etc.

8. New Business

- a. Current By-Law Practices and Challenges Chair Gervais and Director Sauriol Discussion was had over a notice of motion brought forward by Deputy Mayor Abdallah to the July 15, 2025 Council meeting (attached in the meeting package). The motion was withdrawn at the meeting, due to noted conversations with the Mayor, CAO and OPP representatives. Chair Gervais thought it would be beneficial to bring to the PSB for some notation on the contents for future reference. The overview can be captured in totality by viewing the YouTube recording of the meeting at a time stamp of approximately 1:02 p.m. Highlights included:
 - OPP do not typically do by-law enforcement after the new CSPA Act (2023)
 - It can be asked by Council, however, it has to be mutually agreed upon. However, bylaws calls would be prioritized accordingly and need to be fit into the priority system of all other detachment calls at any given time (calls for service can include, mental health, domestic violence, community safety etc.)

- Every by-law enforcement call would also be deemed as a call for service and billed accordingly. From a financial and response time standpoint, there is likely more effective approaches to address by-law matters.
- The City addresses by-law complaints with city employed by-law enforcement officers and contracts out animal control services to Pro-Tec 5.
- If a noise complaint happens outside of City hours, police are called and investigate/collect notes or evidence and relay to city. It is then determined if a fine should be laid.
- A proactive collaboration between the City and OPP for mental health calls and/or out of city's jurisdiction or compromised staff safety police have proven to be a positive working relationship to address community by-law and safety needs while keeping staff safe.
- It was iterated form board members that with the information provided based on current spheres of jurisdiction from the city and OPP and the collaborative work arrangement to address by-law and community safety is the best way to address issues.
- Question regarding scheduling staff after hours to address matters and if this would cost less than having OPP calls for service after hours. Response included that two staff would need to be scheduled which would increase costs significantly.
- Is the detachment at its full compliment after these hires? Response included that there are approximately 8 vacant positions (barring transfers, promotions, vacancies etc.)

Direction: During planning of the 2026 budget, explore opportunities for supporting targeted social media ads regarding OPP recruitment. Work with OPP representatives to assist in offsetting the costs for some targeted social media advertisements to support recruitment for the OPP detachment.

- The Inspector is consulting with Pembroke PSB and other local PSB Boards and municipalities to assist in informing the OPP Engagement Plan. The Engagement Plan will help to create an Action Plan for the detachment.
- There will also be public consultation through an online survey.
- The public survey will provide the opportunity for the community to access and identify what the public feels their priorities for OPP are with a focus on for the next 3 years within the detachment area.
- The detachment action plan will be for the covers entire detachment area.
- Consultations are taking place for the public to identify and articulate priorities of the community.
- The Survey will rank different types of crime in order of priority and subsections will be provided under each crime category.
- Clarifications were made advising that the plan is the OPP's plan overall and that the Police Service Boards and municipalities are being consulted to provide valuable feedback to help shape the survey. The survey results will help to inform and help steer the overall Engagement and Action plans.
- Questions regarding breaking down the concerns and answers from each area so answers can be collated locally for other information purposes was asked. Response included that the OPP will look into having survey participants identify their area of residence and this can be used to collate information for each geographic area, however, the overall plan will be for the entire detachment area.
- The PSB Board indicated general support for the noted key priorities for the UOV OPP Community Engagement Plan consisting of:
 - Public safety and crime prevention
 - Community engagement and partnerships
 - Support for vulnerable populations
 - Traffic and road safety
 - Emergency response and preparedness
